Introduction:

Since September 11, 2001, Americans have put forth great effort to better understand Muslims and the theology of Islam. Stereotypes and misunderstandings still exist as we try to distinguish the religiously based practices from those that are purely cultural. Both Morocco and Southern Spain "Andalusia" have rich historical legacies that exemplify religious and cultural practices of the people, who have inhabited their lands for centuries. We will see the struggle with modernity, globalization, and the challenges that exist today between Europe and Muslim countries across the Mediterranean. Causes of extremism and the need to build relationships between the Muslim world and the U.S.

This study program will deepen participants' understanding of both Christian and Islamic practices, as well as cultural traditions that exist in the two societies. They will have first-hand experiences with their culture, faiths and daily activities of the people. Participants will visit rich historic sites and interact with professors, students, politicians and religious leaders, in addition to enjoying the beauty, food and hospitality in Morocco.

The program is through Loyola University Maryland and conducted in collaboration with *Civilizations Exchange & Cooperation Foundation (CECF)*.

Program Goals/Objectives:

To gain a deeper understanding of:

- The importance of Andalusia Spain within the Islamic Civilizations
- · Theology and its relationship to the daily lives of both Muslims and Christians
- Comparative theology between Christianity and Islam—the religions of Abraham under same God
- Religious traditions and their roots
- Cultural traditions in ancient societies
- The Importance of building relationships with one another in our every shrinking world

Program Requirements:

- Two pre-trip meetings, with lecture component
- Reading: (encouraged to be announced)
- Full participation in lectures and travel to Southern Spain and Morocco
- One post-trip follow-up meeting
- Journaling (encouraged)

Preliminary Itinerary:

- Feb 26 (Fri): Late Departure from the USA (JFK) to (MAD) Madrid, Spain
- Feb 27 (Sat): Arrival to Madrid, Spain (MAD), Travel to Cordoba, Check-in, Tour the City, Torre De Calahorra, CECF Lecture / Discussion (title tba), Dinner Program with the local community
- Feb 28 (Sun): Cordoba Leisurely morning, Attend Sunday Mass at the Baroque Cathedral and continue with a guided tour tour inside the historic Mosque-Cathedral of Cordoba Complex (Mezquita-Catedral De Cordoba). Late Afternoon Travel to Granada, Dinner and Check-in
- Mar 01 (Mon): Granada Tour the Old City and Alhambra Palace, Lunch, Free time and Visit to the Granada Mosque
- Mar 02 (Tue): Depart for Algeciras, Ferry to Tangier, Check-in, Visit the Tomb of Ibn Battuta, Dinner and Free time
- Mar 03 (Wed): <u>Tangier</u> Visit St. Andrew's Church, the Museum of Contemporary Art, and Grand Sooq (Market), Late Afternoon Travel to Fez and *Check-in*
- Mar 04 (Thu): Fez Visit the Old City and its rich, historic educational center, Al Quraween Mosque, Travel to Rabat, Check-in

Born and raised in Syria, graduate of Islamic Law "Shari'ah" from Damascus University and Islamic Studies & Arabic Language from the Islamic Call University in Damascus. He served as an Imam in Damascus, Syria from 1981 to 1989. He was invited to the U.S. to serve as Imam of the Islamic Society of Baltimore from 1989 to 1993. He has taught Islamic Studies and Culture at several colleges and universities in Maryland, including the College of Loyola University Maryland, Ecumenical Institute of Theology at St. Mary's Seminary and University, Johns Hopkins University and other colleges and universities. He served as the Campus Imam at Johns Hopkins University from 1993 to 2003, Adjunct Chaplain at Johns Hopkins Hospital from 2000 to 2003 and the Muslim Chaplain for the Baltimore Police Department from 1998 to 2006. He is President of the Islamic Affairs Council of Maryland and the Founder & President of Civilizations Exchange & Cooperation Foundation (CECF) www.cecf-net.org.

Since 2005, Imam Arafat has visited over 40 countries through the "International Speakers Program" at the U.S. Department of State to lecture on the subject, "Islam & Muslims in America." He was invited to Spain & Morocco through the U.S. Embassies in Madrid and Rabat, in which several universities and religious institutions in both countries were involved. He laid the foundation with Al Quraween University in Fes and Al Hasan II in Casablanca and institutions in Spain for the upcoming program with Loyola University Maryland and other universities. He will serve as the primary interpreter to Arabic for the delegation.

Imam Arafat previously led delegations to Jordan, Syria, Egypt, Spain, Morocco, Kenya, Ethiopia, Tanzania, Saudi Arabia, Malaysia, Indonesia and the Philippines.

Rev. Nguyen received a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) - Higher education from the School of Education—Boston College, a Sacred Theology License (STL) and Master of Divinity (MDiv) from the School of Theology and Ministry—Boston College, a Master of Art in Social Philosophy (MA) from Loyola University Chicago, and a Master of Business Administration (MBA) and Bachelor of Business in Accounting (BBA) from the University of Houston.

He is currently the Assistant Director of International Programs and Coordinator of International Jesuit Collaborations for Loyola University Maryland. He is also Founder and Director of Formation Support for Vietnam—Non-profit organization and a Coordinator, Consultant and Representative for the Vietnamese Catholic Bishops and Major Superiors in Vietnam (2006-Present).

From his early university years, Rev. Nguyen was quite active in a number of capacities such as a chaplain, mentor, computer tutor, teacher of Catholic Catechism for Confirmation, spiritual director, volunteer in a soup kitchen and more.

Rev. Nguyen is interested in international education, administration and supervision, non-profit educational institutes, ecclesiastical theological foundations, student affairs, campus ministry, Catholic tradition, global curriculum, especially Ignatian pedagogy in higher education, and educational development in international communities. He is also interested in educational system in developing countries and cross-cultural issues.
